

The final act at the party was annual elections. They are normally held in August when the membership year starts.

History of the Nevada Stamp Study Society—by John Walter



The Nevada Stamp Study Society was incorporated on August 5, 1975.

The earliest Post Boy archived is June 1977. The issue is 18 pages and <u>posted on our website</u> under Post Boy Archives. It is much too long to reproduce in the entire. At this point in time the club was meeting twice a month in Carson City. Ruthe Dreiling was the Post Boy editor.

A report on the spring (1977) show "Ruthe Dreiling, Emma Vilardi, and Laura Wilhite brought their award-winning



exhibits, which were mounted on boards, each then told what the Judges had told them about improving the exhibit. We are going to ask everyone who exhibited, to please bring theirs, and give us the Judge critique. It is a good way to find out about what to do, and what not to do for an exhibit."

There was also a Special Announcement for everyone to attend the August 6 meeting: "It's the NSSS's second Birthday. After installation of Officers, there will be an Anniversary Party." Seems like the start of our annual picnic.



This is the earliest show cover with cachet and special postmark archived from the 1976 spring stamp show in Carson City.

Interesting observations looking back at early newsletters: The Post Boy title for the newsletter has not changed in 50 years, philatelic raffles were mentioned in 1977, a birthday party was planned every August (now a picnic), annual Christmas party for members and family. Fund raising among members started in 1976 for exhibit frames with a goal of 100 frames (which was achieved).



Today's Dinner Menu on a Postal Card

Are you a lady or a gentleman? If so, you are invited to dine at Rosso's today. I do not recommend the calf brains with tomato sauce. The astounding thing is that this card, from Oct. 2, 1899, advertises a 25¢ dinner served from 11:30am to 3pm and it was postmarked at 11am the same morning. The restaurant location, now a parking area under a freeway, was 0.6 mile from the addressee's residence, both in downtown Pittsburgh, PA.

The postal card has a Barry Postal Machines Co. classic oval postmark and this particular Barry Pittsburgh marking is only known from June 30 to Oct. 2, 1899. So this card shows latest usage. Although it's not rated as a "very common" cancel, it is still only rated "common" because of businesses like Rosso's that mailed multiple cards daily. Check out the menu and bon appétit.

The skies over Reno come alive every September. The 2025 Great Reno Balloon Race is set for September 5–7, 2025, at Rancho San Rafael Regional Park. Event highlights include:

- Dawn Patrol: Balloons launch in the dark, glowing against the early morning sky.
- Mass Ascension: Up to 100 colorful hot air balloons take flight together.
- Special Shapes: Expect whimsical designs like flying pigs, giant bees, and cartoon characters.

The event is advertised as the world's largest free hot-air ballooning event: https://renoballoon.com/

Some of the covers on display have special cachets from past Reno races. Other covers illustrate hot air ballooning.

Big changes are soaring in for 2025! The legendary Reno Air Races—officially the National Championship Air Races (NCAR)—are relocating to Roswell, New Mexico, marking a historic new chapter for the world's fastest motorsport. After 60 years at the Reno-Stead Airport the event is moving to Roswell Air Center, Roswell, NM, September 10–14.

It is still hosted by the Reno Air Racing Association (RARA).

From the mid-1980's to the mid-2000's, the Nevada Stamp Study Society had a booth selling air race covers. Tom Morrissey hand painted many covers that were sold. On display is a small selection of his cachet covers.
